Grammar

The thing is, there's no real logical answer—it's a frustrating truth for both grammar teachers and for students of English that this topic is one in which the only real way to know the difference ultimately is to memorize and practice. There is one principle (NOT a rule—it doesn't always work) that may help. Often, infinitives are used for things that haven't happened yet (with verbs such as *want* and *plan*) and gerunds are used for things that have already happened or are habits (with verbs such as *enjoy* and *quit*).
