If you have a problem and cannot register at your assigned time, please come to the ELI Main Office BEFORE WEDNESDAY, November 19th, to receive a different registration time.

IMPORTANT NOTE #1: You MUST be on time. If you arrive even ONE MINUTE late, you will not be permitted to register at the regular time. You will have to register with the part-time and non-students, and you will be permitted to register only if there is space. *You will also have to pay a late fee of \$40. There will be no exceptions.*

IMPORTANT NOTE #2: The registration takes about an hour. No one will be allowed to leave until it is finished and we have matched your IDs to your forms and we have taken them all and counted them. Please do not make any plans that may conflict with this time.

IMPORTANT NOTE #3: Everyone, bring A PICTURE ID AND A NUMBER 2 PENCIL to registration. We do not have enough pencils to give each person one.
