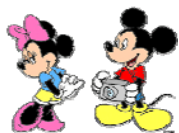

New Recreation Center Policy

Beginning July 1st, all part-time and non-degree-seeking students (including ELI students) will have to pay an additional fee in order to use the Student Recreation & Fitness Center, the Southwest Recreation Center and the Broward Outdoor Recreation Center. The cost is \$225 for six months and you can pay in room 140 in the Southwest Rec Center. This \$225 sounds like a lot, but it really isn't.

These three recreation facilities are supported by a portion of the additional fees full-time, degree-seeking students pay. In **addition** to tuition, a full-time undergraduate pays \$630.36 in fees for one semester and a graduate

student \$534.12. This isn't even counting the extra \$7,000-\$9,000 out-of-state and international students pay in fees!! So, since ELI, non-degree, and part-time students aren't paying all of these fees, they have started charging the extra fee for those who want to use the rec centers. It sounds fair to us!

Of course, all students, including ELI and part-time students, will still have free access to all of the pools on campus, Lake Wauburg, The Florida Gym, the O'Connell Center weight rooms, and the other outdoor fields and courts. All you have to do is show your Gator-1 UF ID.

Notes from the Office

➤ **Appointments:** Students, when you receive a note from the office asking you to make an appointment to see one of our administrators, or if you have a need to see someone, please go to our receptionist in the main office to make the appointment. This allows for time to prepare and have an adequate amount of time to discuss whatever issues may be needed. Please realize that you may have to wait for a long time if

Manners and Culture

Q: Why do people in the US prefer traveling by car rather than by airplane?

Grammar

Q: What's a phrasal verb?

A: Wow, interesting question. A phrasal verb is a verb that adds another word (or words), usually a preposition, that changes the meaning of the action completely. For example, "I dropped him." Contrast that with, "I dropped him off." In the first example, the meaning is very specific...it means that I was carrying him, physically, and I couldn't or wouldn't hold on to him, and I dropped him. In the second case, it means that I was transporting him, most likely in my car, and I drove him to his house and let him out of the car there.

There's a catch. Students are often looking for a shortcut to understanding them, and there isn't one. Each time you change the preposition, you change the meaning entirely—basically, creating a new dictionary word. The only way to master phrasal verbs is to take notice of how they are used and practice, practice, practice, just like you would with any other new vocabulary.
