Notes from the Office

Fall B Students: The deadline to drop or add a class, pay tuition, turn in financial guarantees, and submit proof of insurance or immunizations is <u>Wednesday</u>, <u>October 26th</u>. Language Learning Tips

ELI Teacher Scott Challgren spent the past few months studying Danish in Denmark and has some advice for being a successful language student.

What I have realized after taking Danish lessons in Copenhagen is that those (of us) who commit to doing the homework (at least 90% of the time) excel faster and do better overall. Either you do the outside work to gauge your own progress better, or you remain stagnant in language

development. You also simply MUST get out and use the target language, push yourself to listen to music, read newspapers, magazines, novels, or whatever in the target language, watch TV and movies in the target language, COME TO CLASS on time every day, and engage with the homework and in-class work. There will be days/times when you can't or don't want to do the homework. This is normal, but if you are consistent and do the work expected of you as often as

possible, then taking a "break" from homework only on rare occasions is deserved, and not so detrimental to language acquisition as is being disengaged, indifferent, isolated from the target language and/or simply lazy. That has just been my experience in Denmark. If only all students would BELIEVE us when we tell them this, as well as try doing this, they would truly be amazed at how fast they can and will improve their English. If I can learn Danish after age 40, then anything is possible!

Q: What is Halloween and why is it such a popular holiday in the US?

A: It's actually a combination of ancient Celtic and early Christian traditions. In Europe, All Hallows Eve (the night before All Saints' Day — November 1 on the calendar) was said to be a night when ghosts and spirits would roam the earth; people carved scary faces in vegetables and left them out to scare the spirits away. We see this tradition today with the carved



pumpkins. In the 20th century, it became a popular holiday for children. And, so many of us remember fun at Halloween as kids that it has gradually become a holiday that adults enjoy as well!

Grammar

Q: I don't know when to use articles. When do I use a/an, the, or nothing?

A: The most important question is whether it's singular or plural. Singular count nouns MUST have an article. There are exceptions, but generally this is true. Then you have to decide whether it's a specific noun or a general noun, and who knows the information. There are more specific guidelines but these rules are a good foundation to go on. What article do you think should go in the following examples?

- I want to eat ___ avocado.
- The girl is wearing __ scary costume.
- Let's go see ___ movie you suggested.



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
