Manners and Culture

Q: What is Presidents' Day?

Q: Why is while followed by driving in the sentence below?

Using a cell phone while driving is dangerous.

A: It's a reduced adverb clause. *While* usually uses a progressive (verb+ing) in a generalization, so it's reduced from "While one is driving". You may have also seen the following:

Reduced: Fasten seat belt while seated.

Long version: Drivers must fasten their seat belt while they are seated (sitting).
