Notes from the Office

Taxes: If you studied in the United States in 2018, you must file a tax document with the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) before April 15th. If you do not, it could hurt your chances to get a visa in the future.

If you are on an F-1 or J visa, did not earn income in the US in 2018, and have been in this country for less than 5 years, you need to fill out Form 8843 available on the IRS website.

If you had on-campus employment in 2018, your situation is more complicated, and you should make an appointment with Daryl to make sure you do everything properly.

Question:

I'm applying to graduate school and I need a letter of recommendation. How do I ask my teacher for a letter of recommendation?

Answer:

You are welcome to ask your ELI teachers for letters of recommendation, but your teachers do not have to say yes. Here are some good strategies to follow to maximize your chances for your teachers to say yes. First, you should check your teacher's syllabus for your class. Many teachers explain their policy for writing letters of recommendation in the syllabus. For example, some teachers will only write letters if you get an "A" grade in their class. Also, you should ask your teacher for a letter long before you need it. If you ask your teacher to write your letter on short notice, they will probably be too busy to do it for you! Finally, you should ask Tiffany for a Letter of Recommendation request form. This form allows your teacher to write about your performance at the ELI. If you follow all these steps, you will likely get a good letter of recommendation!

Useful Expressions of the Week

Phrase One: fill out

...you need to <u>fill out</u> Form 8843 available on the IRS website.

Fill out is a phrasal verb. It means to provide and write the missing information on a form or document. This phrasal verb is very similar in meaning to fill in, which has a similar meaning. For example, on a grammar test, you may have a "fill in the blank" section.

Phrase Two: short notice

If you ask your teacher to write your letter <u>on short</u> <u>notice</u>, they will probably be too busy to do it for you!

Short notice means that you do not have much time to prepare for something. In this expression, "notice" means information, and "short" means you have a short amount of time. The opposite of **short notice** is **advance notice**. **Advance notice** means you learn about something a long time before it happens.

Example:

Student: Can you write a letter of recommendation for me? I need it by next week!

Teacher: That is **short notice**, but I think I can do it. Did you **fill out** the Letter of Recommendation request form yet?
