Avoiding Scams

A **scam** is a plan that criminals use to trick you and steal your money or information. Unfortunately, it is difficult to know if something is real or if it is a scam. To protect yourself, follow these tips.

- Never send money to someone you have not met in person. Never make payments by wire transfer, prepaid money card, gift card, or other non-traditional payment methods.
- Be careful about what you share on social media and when dealing with anyone you've met online.
 Scammers will often use your social media to find information about you.
- Don't click on links or open attachments in unexpected emails.
- Don't send private information through email or text messages.
- Don't act immediately if you are pressured to.

Ask **Victoria** if you are not sure if something is real or a scam.
