Manners and Culture

Q: Why aren't there trashcans in the bathroom stalls? Where do I put my used toilet paper?

A: In the US, you flush it. Toilet paper is designed to break apart after it is flushed and most American cities have treatment plans that use bacteria to process the organic matter and toilet paper. After it goes through this process, it is safe to be reused for reclaimed water to water lawns, for example. However, there are many things that you should never flush: paper towels, including the brown ones in UF restrooms, sanitary napkins, diapers, toys, towels or rags, cleaning wipes, condoms, cotton. You should also avoid flushing medicine down the toilet, since this can harm wildlife. If it isn't coming out of your body and isn't toilet paper, put it in the garbage can.

Q: What's the most important holiday in the US?

A: Well, that's a tough question, mainly because there are so many holidays that hold special meanings to so many people. Our biggest family holiday is probably Thanksgiving. This is the one holiday that is specifically about visiting family and friends. It's a big feast day that isn't specially linked to any one religion or set of beliefs. Many people fly or drive to visit their family in other states.

Grammar

Q: What's the difference between "must" and "should"?

A: There are actually lots of uses for both words, but the most common use for both of them is to talk about obligation. "Must" means that there is no choice it's an absolute obligation. "Should" means that the action is advisable, but there is a choice.

- You **must** come to class to keep your visa.
- You **should** make American friends to improve your English.

Q: What's the difference between "under" and "underneath"?

A: There's not a large difference; in most cases, they're probably interchangeable. The biggest difference is that "underneath" connotes an idea that something is under something else and is hidden or not readily visible.

- The cat is under the table. [It's visible.]
- The cat is underneath the couch. [It isn't visible.]

Q: What's the difference between "advise" and "advice"?

A: The first one's a verb and the second one's a noun. The pronunciation of the "s" is [z] and the pronunciation of the "c" is [s].

- I advise you to go to class every day.
- My **advice** is that you go to class every day.
