Using myELI

myELI is a useful website for ELI students. Here are some important things you can do on the website.

Upload your documents— Every semester, you have to give the ELI many different forms. myELI makes submitting documents easy and convenient! From the myELI homepage, click on "My Profile" and then "Documents." Here, you can upload your insurance forms, proof of immunizations, I-20, financial statement, and other required documents. If you have not uploaded your required documents for this semester, do it now!

Check your attendance—

Attending your classes every day is important for success at the ELI. With myELI, you can check your attendance to see how many classes you have missed and how many times you have been late. To check your attendance, click on "My Courses" and then "Attendance" from the myELI homepage. If you see any mistakes, ask your teacher to confirm your attendance.

Notes from the Office

Immunizations & Insurance: Immunization and insurance information is due! If you have not submitted your documents, you will soon get a message from the ELI office. You may be removed from class until you can turn in your documents. If you have any questions about immunizations or insurance, talk to Victoria in the ELI office.

Tardies: We know that some students have a long walk between their classroom buildings, but it is still important that you be responsible and get to class as quickly as you can. If you know you have a long walk, your teachers can give you some extra time, but don't stop to get coffee or have lunch on the way! Remember that being late to class 3 times counts as an absence and it is disruptive to the other students. If you are late, try to come in quickly and quietly to join in to the lesson. Remember that you can check your absences and tardies through myELI.

Question:

What do Americans do for Valentine's Day?

Answer:

Valentine's Day is February 14th. Many people, especially couples, go out to dinner for Valentine's Day. However, the restaurants will be very busy and some have special menus that are more expensive. Some people go to the movies or have a special dinner at home. Groups of friends might get together to go out so everyone feels included. Children exchange cards and candy at school.

Useful Expressions of the Week

Expressions of the Week: In the CIP Insider, you saw two underlined phrases.

Phrase One: in advance

Tickets are \$85.00 for one day if you buy them three days in advance.

In advance is a useful phrase! It means that you will do something before something else. In this example, it means that the tickets will be cheaper if you buy them three days before you go to Busch Gardens.

For another example, you should tell your teachers **in advance** if you are going to miss class. This means that you should tell them before you miss class, not after.

Phrase Two: ASAP

For help getting the cheapest tickets, talk to Tate in the CIP office **ASAP**!

ASAP is an acronym. It means As Soon As Possible. This means that you should do something right away or as soon as you can.

When we say this word, we pronounce it as "A sap," with "A" pronounced like the name of the letter. If you don't understand, ask your teacher to help you ASAP!
