The University of Florida is requiring that all classes this summer semester be online. This means that all ELI Summer C and B classes will only be online next semester. The ELI semester dates will not change. Summer C classes will begin May 15th and end August 7th. Summer B classes will begin June 29th and end August 7th.

You can take the online classes here in the United States or in your home country. If you want to take the classes in your home country, you must let Daryl know. If you have an F-1 visa, you can maintain your student status in your home country by taking the online Summer C classes. If you have not completed the Returning Student Survey in myELI or if your plans for Summer have changed, please contact Daryl at studyenglish@eli.ufl.edu. It is important that he knows your plans so he can take correct action with your I-20 in SEVIS.

To study next semester, you must check in for the Summer C term in myELI between May 4 – 8. Because all of the classes will be online, the ELI will be using digital books for the summer terms.

We plan to return to regular, in-person classes for the Fall C 2020 semester that starts September 1, but will follow guidance by the University of Florida and state government officials.

Manners and Culture

Q: Why do Americans care about animals more than humans?

A: Most of us don't. However, our pets (particularly dogs and cats) are definitely treated as part of the family by most of us who have them.

Q: Is it okay to bring home leftover food from a restaurant? Can I offer it to my friends?

A: To the first part of the question, absolutely! Even we know that our portions are larger in our restaurants. Most Americans will ask for a to-go box for leftover food at a restaurant. For the second part of your question, it's fine if you know someone well, and more so if it's something you didn't actually eat any of.

O: What does the name "America" mean?

A: It's a mapmaker's mistake. Back in the age of exploration, there was an Italian explorer named Amerigo Vespucci.
