*Students who receive a failing grade are only permitted to return as a probationary student and will not get a certificate.

ELI Attendance Policy

- Students must attend 85% of classes.
- If you miss more than 15% of classes, you will not receive a certificate and will only be allowed to return to the ELI on a probationary basis.
- If you miss more than 25% of classes, you can no longer attend the ELI and your I-20 will be terminated.
- If you miss more than 5 days of class in a row (3 days in a row in B terms) in any class without informing the ELI, you can be expelled from the ELI.

Translator Use in Classroom Policy *(example blurb, instructors create own policy)*

Translators can be an effective tool for learning language; however, the use of translators is only permitted on some assignments in class. Translators are never allowed for final ELI exams, so students should be sure to prepare for exams and assignments without the use of a translator. Your teacher will inform you if translators are or are not allowed to be used on the different assignments in class.

ELI Scholarships

In the long (Fall C, Spring C, and Summer C) semesters, the ELI awards a tuition-free semester to two full-time students through the Jayne C. Harder Memorial and the JC Casagrande Peace scholarships. The students must meet the following criteria at the time of nomination:

THE MINIMUM CRITERIA TO BE NOMINATED FOR SCHOLARSHIPS:

1. The student studies full-time at the ELI.
2. Academic Excellence: The student has a GPA of 4.0 at midterm.
3. Outstanding Progress: The student displays outstanding progress in language skills as evidenced by coursework.
4. Excellent Attendance and Participation: The student regularly participates in and attends ELI classes.
5. Practices English: The student makes every effort to practice English while at the ELI, in class, and at ELI-sponsored activities.

Classroom Policies for Cheating and Plagiarism

All levels include: Cheating is when a student uses materials or resources that is not approved by the teacher. Some **examples** include (but are not limited to):

1. You look at your friend's paper and your teacher says this is not okay.
2. Your teacher says you cannot get help with homework, and you get help.
3. You copy from another student's test during an exam.
4. You have a "cheat sheet," on a test or an assignment and your teacher does not give permission for one.
5. You use a dictionary when the teacher says you can't

Levels 30 and up include: Plagiarism is a form of cheating. It is when a student submits work as her/his own, but it is copied from elsewhere. The work can be as small as an idea, a phrase or sentence, or it can be a whole paper.

Penalties for academic dishonesty. Following are only examples. Please use what system works best for you.

1st offense:

- Talk to the student
- Have student redo the exercise without a point penalty

2nd offense:

- Official written warning is given to student
- Student is permitted to redo the exercise with a point penalty

3rd offense:

- Official written warning is given to the student
- Student receives a zero on the assignment

Recording in Classes (optional):

Students may record video or audio of class lectures. A “class lecture” is an educational presentation intended to inform or teach students in a class. The person lecturing can be the regular instructor or a guest instructor.

How these recordings may be used are strictly controlled. Recordings can only be used (1) for personal educational use, (2) in connection with a complaint to the university, or (3) as evidence in, or in preparation for, a criminal or civil proceeding. All other purposes are prohibited. Students may not publish recorded lectures without the written consent of the instructor.

Following are not class lectures and cannot be recorded:

- student presentations
- class activities that involve only student participation
- quizzes, tests, exams
- field trips
- private conversations between students in the class
- private conversations between a student and the faculty or lecturer during a class session

No one can publish a class lecture without permission of the instructor. To “publish” means to share, distribute, or provide access to a recording in any format or medium with any other person, including another student within the same class. A recording, or transcript of a recording, is considered published if the whole thing or any part of it is published on any media platform. A student who publishes a recording without written consent may be sued by a person injured by the publication.

Viewpoints Expressed in the Class (optional):

We will talk about many different topics in this class. As your instructor, I do not intend to promote a certain viewpoint and it is important that ELL students use their own analysis of the data and sources of the materials and readings to decide whether or not they agree with their classmates and/or instructor.

What is Language Assistant (LA) Class?

In the Language Assistant class you practice the objectives we study in Listening/Speaking, learn about life in the US, and practice more of your informal speaking skills. Your LAs carefully prepare different activities that will help you improve your overall use of English in many ways. The LA class is not graded but is very important!
