

How To Live A Hundred Years?

Have you ever heard about blue zones? Blue zones were first created in 2004, by Dan Buettner, a National Geographic Explorer, who highlighted places of extreme longevity and the causes of this phenomenon. Buettner and the team found that there are many aspects related with lifestyle habits that makes longevity the secret of all blue zones, and they called them Power 9. This is a compelling finding in the last decades that has been studied widely to achieve the goal of living longer and healthier (New York Times, BBC, 2023). Sardinia, Italy, is one of those places where researchers have been studying centenarians for the last 50 years. To illustrate, Villa Grande is an Italian Island tucked in the mountains, which has one of the highest concentrations of centenarians in the world (10% of the total population of Sardinia), which is three times higher than the national average, according to Seth Doane (2021). Researchers attested that the main secrets for living longer are related with eating healthy, being active, working and connecting socially, They suggest that beyond the family environment, there are genetic factors that influence survival and longevity. (Montesano A. 2011)

Well, some people might say that longevity isn't related with lifestyle or genetics, they argue that the only necessary thing to live longer is accumulating material wealth, but the truth is that there are a host of variables that affect the life expectancy of each person. Genetics are an important factor for setting you up, but the rest is just lifestyle, particularly the diet, regular exercise, community, family and education.

Furthermore, talking about genetics, longevity has a strong genetic component, such as the presence of APOE gene and FOXO3A gene, which are "involved in the protection of cardiovascular diseases, which have been shown to be associated with longevity in nearly all studies" (C. Caruso et. al, 2022). The aging process is influenced by the molecular damage that affects the performance of each person, and the way people adapt to the environment. These mechanisms slow down the damage but they can be affected positively or negatively by various factors, such as: nutrition, exercise, stress management, genetics, sex and gender, socioeconomic and educational status, and social support.

Researchers have homed in on a specific genetic mutation that plays a role in cardiovascular diseases, one of the most important studies demonstrated a novel form of gene therapy that could rejuvenate aging hearts. Many centenarians carried a specific, unique gene mutation in the gene BPIBF4, associated with lower rates of cardiovascular diseases, leading to a gene therapy that in certain ways has the potential for rejuvenating heart cells and in some cases reversing several signs of heart aging. (Haridy R. 2023) Dr. Leiper, Medical Director at the British Heart Foundation states that these discoveries could pave the way to a treatment that reverses the decline of heart aging.

Centenarians are people with a beautiful long life span, above one hundred years, but what are their secrets? Johny Pes, professor of the University of California, interviewed many of them to study this phenomenon, with incredible results. This community reveals that their secrets for living longer are starting in celebrating themselves every day, drinking a coffee in the morning and honoring their longevity. Likewise, the whole world talks about Sardinia; researchers found their own analysis that working hard for long periods of time, even at an advanced age, is one of the factors which kept centenarians totally active and healthy. Diet is another important factor that the researchers found to be a common healthy behavior in centenarians. Centenarians fasted during work hours, followed by a diet with more protein and fat in later years, which contributed to longer life spans (*An Italian village celebrates its many centenarians* 2021).

Some people might say that accumulating material wealth is the way to achieve a long and healthy life, also known as longevity. Admittedly there is a correlation between social status, economic stability and longevity. Nevertheless, studies suggest that the associations observed between wealth and longevity were modest; the result of the study shows that there is a 1%

absolute difference in the correlation of survival and wealth. At the very end, there is not enough evidence to support a strong relationship. Follow up analyses are needed to confirm the magnitude of these associations (Finegood, 2021). Examples are evident when analyzing the variable of GDP per capita and longevity. There are many outlier countries with a lower GDP per capita, but higher longevity values, such as Chile, with a GDP of 22,105 and a life expectancy of 80.7 years; compared to the United States with a GDP of 55,335 and a life expectancy of 78.99 years. Another example is South Korea with a GDP of 37,928 and a life expectancy of 83.34 years, compared to the United Arab Emirates with a GDP of 76,398 and a life expectancy of 79, 63 years. (Zijdeman et al. 2019). With this in mind, it is possible to conclude that there is not a general rule for making a strong correlation between wealth and longevity.

Education is another important topic that is worth mentioning. One social factor that is directly related with longevity and that many researchers agreed with is Education. Even more important than race and wealth, keeping young and old people in school can make the difference. A few years of extra school is associated with extra years of life. In 1999, a graduate student at Columbia University published a doctoral dissertation in economics, which corroborated the correlation between education and health. Investing in education is like investing in your own health and life span. Dr. Lleras Muney, assistant professor in Princeton, performed a study where she compared the life span in the population census before and after the government law changed, making children go to school for longer periods of time. The results were unbelievable: people who attend just one extra year to school live one and a half years more than their peers who don't. Finally, Dr. Lleras states that educated people are better at controlling their impulses, which can help them to make better decisions and plan for the future. There are definitely a host of advantages that education could bring to everybody's life.

Furthermore, living in a tight community can also be an important part of healthy lifestyles. Social cohesion could be another secret for living longer. A lot of studies have shown associations between religion and longer life expectancies. Specifically, the explanation in some studies was that people who attend religious services regularly show a reduction in their body's stress responses and even in mortality. Marino Bruce and his team from Vanderbilt University, measure clinical settings, such as blood pressure and hormones related with stress responses,

and demonstrate a significantly lower risk of early death in churchgoers (46% less likely to die). Similarly, Nigel Barber (PhD) studied the relationship between religiosity and longevity and concluded that religious Americans have stronger immune systems and they are prone to promote healthier lifestyles. As a result they improve stress management and establish better social support and a bunch of health advantages (Barber, 2021). In conclusion, all of these studies are trying to demonstrate that the important factor about longevity in religious people is that they are a very tight community, they support each other. In short, social cohesion is another secret for living longer.

With this in mind, how to live a hundred years? You must think about many factors that are directly related to longevity. There is not just one specific topic that you can focus on. There are many scientific studies and empirical evidence that demonstrates that the most important factors are eating healthy, being active, working and connecting socially. It is true that genetics play an important role in the life span of each individual, but that is not enough. There is a wide variety of lifestyle habits which can change the way you adapt to the environment and the way your genes are expressed. For this reason we need to debunk the belief of accumulating material wealth, because the correlation between wealth and longevity is modest. There are other factors that pave the way to pursue longevity.

The Dynamic landscape of Immigration in the US

This influx has not only impacted the demographic landscape, but the labor market, educational level and health of the nation. Immigrants are a vital segment of the workforce, contributing to the economic growth of the country. The US has vast resources to offer to individuals who are seeking educational opportunities, and immigrants take advantage of that fact upon arriving in the country. Moreover, exploring the intersection of race and health, foreign-born individuals shed light on their intrinsic experiences. It is time to reconsider the narrative surrounding immigrants and evaluate their contributions, emphasizing the need for comprehensive and equitable policies. While critics argue that immigration has become a burden and has caused negative effects on society, we highlight the undeniable contributions that immigrants make to the country, and their multifaceted impact should be considered in the nation's prosperity.

The labor market, in particular, has been significantly influenced by the presence of immigrants. They were about 17% of the workforce in the US in 2014, being a prominent part of the growth economy. For example, in that year, almost half of domestic workers, 36% of textile manufacturing, 33% of the agriculture and 32 % of the accommodation, were immigrants (as cited in Reading 1). They fill essential roles across various sectors, from manual labor to highly skilled professions, addressing gaps in the workforce and sustaining economic growth. Immigrants contribute to the development of the country.

College-educated immigrants form a noteworthy segment of the immigrant population, contributing to the intellectual capital of the US. In Reading 3, authors show interesting statistics which demonstrate that in many cases, immigrants are more proficient in English than in the past, and they tend to have more advantaged degrees than Americans, "In 2018, 14 percent of immigrants college-graduated held professional or doctoral degrees, compared to 10 percent of their US born counterparts." (Reading 3) Those individuals also bring new perspectives and

expertise, fostering innovation and competitiveness on a global scale. Often the majority of college-educated immigrants have highly educated spouses. Educated immigrants should be recognized and their potential should be promoted as a crucial aspect for maintaining the US position as a hub for research, development, and progress.

The intersectionality of race and health among immigrants gives another layer to the debate. Looking at the health path of immigrants, we can find valuable insights into the future health of the US. By observing nativity and racial disparities in hypertension, diabetes and obesity, the Reading 4 highlights how immigrants' health outcomes vary as they stay in the country context even though some immigration policies increase the hostility that immigrants face and limit their access to social services. In general, upon arriving in the country, immigrants tend to have better health profiles than their native-born counterpeers, which improve when they access the social services and adapt to the local culture (Reading 4) This is another benefit that foreign-born people bring to the US. Understanding the challenges faced by different racial and ethnic groups in the immigrant community is essential for crafting policies that promote inclusivity and well-being of individuals.

Some may argue that the increased number of immigrants has caused negative effects on American's society. It is true that the immigration system has spiked in the country, and more than 1.1 million of immigrants are pending for VISAS in immigration courts. However, my point still stands because the policies for this matter have not always been stable and efficient, and political parties have prioritized their interests over the human reasons, (Reading 1). Immigrants contribute economically, culturally and socially to develop the country, enriching the American tapestry in ways that extend beyond essential values.

In conclusion, the evolving landscape of immigration in the US needs a nuanced perspective. Immigrants impact positively on the labor market, educational level and health of the nation. While immigrants continue to shape the nation's identity, policies must adapt to foster an environment that recognizes and values their contributions. Embracing the cultural, economic, and intellectual richness that immigrants bring ensures a brighter and more inclusive future for the US.

One of the best CIP activities is Pumpkin Painting at the Bat Houses. It was my first time painting





The New Era Of Bilingual Education And The Advantages In The United States

Have you ever thought how speaking a second language can boost your professional and personal goals? The new era and the implementation of bilingual education have been opening doors and opportunities to our children to succeed in many aspects such as academic, cultural, and professional goals. Nowadays, the English language is the most studied language in the world; according to the British Council, approximately 1.5 billion people around the world are learning English, but what about other languages, like Spanish? "With 41 million Spanish native speakers and 12 million bilinguals, the United States is already the second-largest Spanish-speaking country in the world" (Quartz, 2015). With this in mind, bilingualism is an extraordinarily important quality that parents, schools, and universities must be promoting.

Bilingual education is defined by Merriam-Webster dictionary as: in an English-language school system in which students with little fluency in English are taught in both their native language and English (2023). In other words, this system of education is characterized by schools that implement the two languages in their classes, their native language and English. Other

opinions are that bilingual education is not an effective or appropriate model of education in the United States. Some people feel that the language of instruction in all levels of public education should be in English. Admittedly, there are some misconceptions about bilingual education, some people might say that bilingual education can confuse children, some others argue that they have smaller vocabulary in both languages, or maybe that they are going to mix phrases with words of both languages, or present language delays. These beliefs about bilingual education make sense, but statistically there are a host of advantages that bilingual education can achieve, including cognitive skills, late onset of certain diseases such as dementia, and alzheimers, cultural advantages, job opportunities, neuroplasticity and much more.

According to the researchers from Yale University, bilingual education has much to contribute to the developing brain; there are some minor disadvantages in bilingualism, instead, bilingual education has a lot of enrichment, developing cultural and cognitive skills and a host of advantages. (Kristina R. Olson, 2014). For example, researchers studied the concept of neuroplasticity: how our brains change across our lives, and this condition allows patients with brain injuries to partially recover, or at least develop a greater capacity in another one of their senses. Other findings suggest that bilinguals have a later onset (about 4 years on average) of Dementia and Alzheimer's disease. Furthermore, executive control and memory benefits have also been found, applicable to many scenarios outside the context, opening doors in social and experiential opportunities.

Equally as important, Voice of America in 2019, reported an increase in dual language immersion programs, researchers have shown that English learners do best in dual language programs. There are other methods to achieve bilingual education in most states. For instance, the students are mostly taught in their native language but also receive English training, but dual-language immersion programs offer classes in two languages (English and another language). Rand corporation in 2019 shows an increasing trend in popularity of dual immersion programs in the US, with an estimated between 1,000 and 2,000 in 2017. States are looking to expand their bilingual education by economically supporting colleges and universities for the next generation of English Language Learners educators for developing programs with the accurate knowledge and skills necessary to teach English.

In other concerns, parents of bilingual children have a lot of questions about the pros and cons of bilingual education. Will it be confusing? Will there be language delays? Nevertheless, there is not any scientific evidence that shows these programs are confusing or affect language development. For example, some people argue that bilingual children mix words from two languages. It is true that they can use both languages in some informal scenarios, but that is called code mixing, and that behavior is completely normal. Rather than being a sign of confusion, it shows the ability to modulate their language according to the situation, they can perfectly discriminate between languages depending on the need. Professors (Phd) of MacGill University said that "Bilingual education is only one way to promote successful early development... it is a window to the world... myths and misunderstandings are common, but facts are hard to come by." (Byers & Lew-Williams, 2014).

Some people think that bilingual students slow down a child's ability to learn English, but that is not the case; as we see, two studies from Stanford University evaluated 9,000 ELLs enrolled in English-immersion programs, 4,000 were attending bilingual programs, 3,000 were attending transitional bilingual programs, and 2,000 enrolled dual-language programs that also include native English speakers. Researchers found that students who were enrolled in bilingual programs since elementary school were proficient in English compared with similar students who had been in all-English programs. (Maxwell, 2014). In particular, researchers from Washington State University found that bilingualism is associated with cognitive benefits such as increased control over attention, improved working memory, multitasking and better abstract and symbolic representation skills. These qualities let students achieve good public test scores, and finally better outcomes to go to the best public and private universities.

Thus, bilingual education has been proven to increase rates in laboral opportunities because the industry is looking for the characteristics of a bilingual person. A lack of proficiency in one's home language is associated with annual income losses between \$2.100 and \$3.300, according to the University of Phoenix Research Institute (2014), It is worth mentioning that the economic advantages are a wide spectrum of benefits for bilingual people; for example, bilingualism helps individuals obtain certain occupations, higher status jobs, such as doctors, lawyers, and executives, even with similar levels of education. Also for bilingual people who don't

have a high level of education there is an advantage over monolinguals in other kinds of opportunities, for example manual jobs and skill services, such as police officers, medical assistants, and receptionists.

As another result of bilingual education experts suggest that individuals who received bilingual education have better skills in intergroup relationships, identity, and self esteem. Studies from Canada and the United States demonstrate that bilingual education can have those positive effects. Bilingualism is closely related to psychological development, specifically related with self-related constructs. As a result bilingual education gives the opportunity to develop different self-structures in their different languages, and also, the possibility of interrelating with other cultures and acquiring the bicultural identity. (Chen & Padilla, 2019). With this in mind, it is important to highlight the importance of being bilingual in the new era for being successful.

To conclude, recognizing the host of advantages that bilingual education represents to our population, we can be totally convinced that parents can be proud and sure to start from the beginning teaching their children in two languages at the same time. Myths and misunderstandings are common, but studies, professors, and evidence shows that these myths are debunked. With this in mind, as stated in the main statement, to be bilingual is an extraordinarily important quality that parents, schools, and universities must promote.

This is one of the immigration's issues and it is not just Mia's story. Many students are living moments like that, and they need to achieve the learning of a second language while adapting to a new country. Can bilingual education help them to make it possible?


Bilingual education has long been a topic of debate in the U.S. For almost 40 years, Dr. Ellen Bialystok, from York University, and her team have studied bilingualism, finding evidence on both sides of this argument, but the advantages are superiors, and showed that, "bilinguals have, on average, stronger executive control," (Guirgis & Olson, 2014). This enhanced executive control makes some bilinguals' abilities stronger. According to published studies, (as cited in Golderberg & Wagner, 2015) nearly six meta-analyses can strongly support that instruction in a mother language improves English skills in students and two Stanford University researchers found evidence proving that students in bilingual programs from elementary to high school achieve higher proficiency in English when compared with others who had not been in them. While some argue that the language of instruction in public education should be exclusively English, bilingual education stands as an effective and appropriate model of education in the U.S. It promotes inclusivity, cultural competence, and cognitive development, making it a valuable asset to the nation.

One of the main strengths of bilingual education is its ability to connect diverse student populations, making it valuable for inclusivity . In a nation that is as culturally rich as it is varied, an inclusive environment for students from different language backgrounds is essential. The resources for this purpose are available, "The United States has great linguistic resources we are not only failing to use...; [m]ore than 11 million of the country's 50 million public school students speak at least one of 400 different languages other than English at home" (Goldenberg & Wagner, 2015). It is clear that diversity is present in the U.S. and bilingual programs are needed to allow ELLs to maintain their native language and identity while learning English, providing all students with equal access to educational opportunities. Bilingual classrooms bring students together from different backgrounds, fostering a sense of inclusion and respect. This environment also promotes tolerance and empathy, so students with strong language skills can engage better with society. Then, they can participate fully in the same professional opportunities as their English-speaking peers.


In an increasingly interconnected world, being bilingual is an asset for cultural competence. It prepares students to communicate with other language-speakers and understand different cultures. By speaking more than one language, students can become

competitive, being provided with a valuable skill that might enhance their future job opportunities, and engage stronger with a global society. Bilingualism offers opportunities for a better communication, "Bilinguals can make friends in more than one language meaning more opportunities to meet new people...{b}eing able to communicate with people from other cultures is a huge social advantage and can open up so many more doors in life." (EOLE BILINGUAL de Berkeley, 2013). Learning a second language at an early age allows children knowledge of multiple languages in the future. This is a prominent benefit for traveling and speaking with members of the family who still live in the country of an immigrant child's origin, keeping them in connection with their culture and history, (Akhtar & Menjivar, 2012 as cited in Heinlin & Lew-Williams, 2013) Restricting education to English only may rob students of significant skills for the demand of the global economy, in which communication with individuals from different backgrounds is essential. Culture is manifested in several forms; as more skilled individuals are to speak in another language, more information can be transmitted and more knowledge can be acquired. Understanding who others are makes individuals culturally competitive and better qualified for a globalized world.

It may probably be thought that the U.S has a small bilingual population and should not be concerned about this issue. Instead, some statistics have shown that a surprising 23% of the country's population is bilingual.



This percentage might still seem small due to it being under the average, and lower in comparison with other developed countries. However, it represents 76 million people, and this number has been growing up during the last few years.

In other words, bilingualism is a prominent issue in the U.S. and bilingual education in all American states should not be relegated anymore. The statistics are very clear, "With a population of about 331 million, the US is much larger than the largest EU country, which is Germany"; "Whether you are working overseas in development, health care, or education, in diplomacy or in the military, your success depends on your ability to work well with colleagues in that country and to be persuasive. You must build relationships." (Leveen, n.d.). Being bilingual is undoubtedly a great advantage for cultural competence.

Research suggests that bilingualism can lead to better cognitive development. In the instance, it seems that preschoolers acquire better skills to understand their surrounding when interacting with those from other groups (Bialystok & Senman, 2004; Goetz, 2023; Kovacs, 2009 as cited in Heinlin & Lew-Williams, 2013); "bilinguals appear to perform a little bit better than monolinguals on tasks that involve switching between activities and inhibiting previously learned

responses (Bialystok, Craik & Luk, 2012 as cited in Heinlin & Lew-Williams, 2013). Even in infants, bilingualism has memory advantages; "for example, generalizing information from one event to a later event (Brito & Barr, 2012 as cited in Heinlin & Lew-Williams, 2013). Acknowledging and understanding two languages has significant effects in the brain, as an example, researchers from Washington State University have revealed that "increased control over attention, improved working memory, greater awareness of the structure and form of language, and better abstract and symbolic representations skills" are some cognitive benefits of bilingualism (as cited in Goldenberg & Wagner, 2015).

At this point, it is proven that bilingualism impacts individuals positively no matter how old they are . The U.S. has a long history of immigration, and many families continue to speak their mother languages at home. Furthermore, bilingual education acknowledges and respects the linguistic diversity of the country while continuing to ensure students are proficient in English. "data from Spanish-speaking students in Texas's Rio Grande Valley, found that bilingual education can help promote bilingualism without significantly sacrificing English proficiency," (as cited in Goldenberg & Wagner, 2015). Therefore, some myths about bilingual education keep being an obstacle nowadays.

Those on the other side of the issue may say that bilingual education can delay the ELLs integration into American society. Nevertheless, my point still stands because studies have demonstrated that well-designed programs might contribute to the English language-learning and provide a strong foundation in the future student's curriculum. In 2010, the U.S. had nearly 1,000 bilingual programs in public schools, said Gregg Roberts, the director of dual-language studies at American Councils Research Center. Other states, such as California, Texas, North Carolina and New York had more than 200 of those programs, while Washington, Minnesota, New Mexico and Florida each had between 100 and 200 programs, (Galvan, A. 2022). Also the support from parents can motivate ELLs, finding a balance that contributes to developing their proficiency in both, native and foreign languages, which facilitates the quick insertion in other programs. How can knowledge prevent the integration of individuals into a society? **More language-skilled students do not delay their approach to American culture, but give them a**

tool to manage their journey. The lack of bilingual education in the country delays the comprehensive and inclusive development that is required for competitive professionals.

For all these reasons, bilingual education is an effective and appropriate model of education in the U.S. It promotes inclusivity, cultural competence, and cognitive development. By giving equal opportunities to ELLs and addressing the barriers, they can insert themselves in society. The establishment of adequate policies in schools should be encouraged in all states of the country. Diversity promotes empathy and open minds, while expanding cultural competence, cognitive development, and elevates self-esteem in individuals. Inclusivity is basic for the sustainable cities that we all are called to build. It is time to stand, without distinctions, as a whole nation for a better and prosperous future.

The Big Positive Impact Of Immigration Movement In The United States

Immigration is an important sociocultural and economic controversial topic nowadays. Some people might be alarmed at the current levels of immigration into the United States. Most of them argue that there needs to be strict limits on who is allowed to come to the United States, and at the same time people against immigration movement think that there must be barriers for obtaining legal residency and work permits. But the truth is that immigrants play an important role in many fields of the economy in the United States, without immigrants, the United States workforce would decline from 173.2 million in 2015 to 156.6 million in 2035, in other words the workforce is expected to grow to 183.2 million if immigration levels remain steady, according to the Council on Foreign Relations (Felter et al., 2023).

First, there are some important statistics. Immigrants comprise almost 14% (44 million people) of the United States total population, and their U.S born children make up about 28% of United States inhabitants (Council of Foreign Relations, 2020). Immigrants play an important role in the U.S economy. Large portions of the workforce in the U.S are constituted by immigrants in many fields, such as textile manufacturing, agriculture, and accommodation. In 2014, according to the Pew Research Center immigrants comprised 17% of the U.S workforce, 36% in U.S textile manufacturing, 33% in agriculture, and 32% in accommodation. This evidence allows us to conclude that immigrants are an important part of the economic growth in the United States; without immigrants the US workforce would decline in striking proportions (Felter et al., 2023)

Immigrants are an important source of higher-educated workers. In 2018 according to the Migration Policy Institute, 17% of college-educated U.S adults were born abroad; 32% of all immigrants had a bachelor's degree or higher levels of education and 47% in the last 5 years attended college. Conversely, the number of immigrants with higher levels of education in the United States has grown rapidly since 1990, with an increased percentage of 87%, and in the U.S population has also grown but at a slower rate with a percentage of 33%. With this in mind,

college-educated immigrants are more likely to have advanced degrees than their U.S born peers, 29% of the total immigrant population held professional, master's or doctoral degrees. For this reason, it is important that the government promote international education and give the opportunity to the immigrant population to stand out for their high skills (Olsen & Batalova, 2022)

On the other hand, Republicans, who are people supporting the republican government, are encouraging others to make a final decision to stop the immigration movement, they are calling for a return to Trump's hardline policies. According to the Reuters February Survey in 2021, 50% of all Americans said that they did not want to accept more refugees. Furthermore, Republicans are becoming more opposed to programs that benefit immigrants, and they are planning to increase the security measures in the border with Mexico. It is true that there is a huge increase in the number of illegal immigrants. Nevertheless, the point still stands because if the government supports the immigration movement, instead of prohibiting and stopping immigration completely, then the workforce and the high-educated workers will continue to increase. Positively, according to the Reuters February Survey in 2021, 61% of American adults support a path to citizenship for illegal immigrants. The number of Americans who do not want more fencing along the Mexican border has more than doubled over the past six years (Kahn & Morgan, 2021). In short, an October 2020 poll showed that 63% of the U.S population approve the policies to help immigrant population to obtain work permits. At the very end, Trump and the republicans vilify the migrants as criminals and potential terrorists, but this did not sway the elections, handing the Democrats the control, and proving that immigrants instead of being harmful for American Society, are beneficial in many aspects (Kahn & Morgan, 2021). To conclude, it is almost impossible to feel that immigration could harm the United States society, oppositely, it is an important factor for the economic growth. Furthermore, immigrants are increasing the number of high-education levels and are keeping the workforce stable. It seems more like a false perception of many U.S citizens that are vilifying the immigrants as criminals and potential terrorists. Despite this bad reputation, the truth is that without immigrants the U.S economy could be negatively impacted on a great scale. The value that immigrants can give to the United States is significant enough to start promoting and facilitating the pathway for accepting immigrants as part of the U.S society.





Beyond Wealth: Multifaceted Pathways to Longevity

Imagine thriving communities in Sardinia, Okinawa, or Loma Linda, where longevity is not an exception but a norm, often not because of extreme wealth but due to a rich life experience. The quest for a long life, the desire to extend the human lifespan, has always been a popular topic, attracting countless theories about how to achieve it. The role of material wealth in this quest is particularly contentious. Some people might say that the accumulation of material wealth is crucial to achieving a longer life due to the access and opportunities it affords. However, this essay argues that longevity is influenced more profoundly by factors such as genetics, lifestyle choices, psychological well-being, and social integration, rather than the accumulation of material wealth.

Science tells us that our genes are a big reason behind how long we might live, and it does not have anything to do with how much money we have. There are some special people called "superagers," individuals who live robust lives past 80. Researchers highlight the crucial role of genetics in longevity, an area untouched by one's wealth. For example, "superagers," often have unique gene mutations that significantly slow down aging processes, particularly heart aging (Haridy, 2023). Moreover, scientist have done studies on twins to understand the role of genes in how long we live. These studies found out that longevity is 20-30% genetic, highlighting the inherent nature of lifespan determination (Liota, 2011). So, while many factors can affect our lifespan, our genes are an important piece of the puzzle.

Lifestyle choices, including diet, physical activity, and stress management, are integral to longevity, often transcending the benefits offered by material wealth. The "Blue zones," are places in the world where individuals commonly live past 100 years. In regions like Ikaria, Greece, and Okinawa, Japan, the secret to such extended lifespans is that diets are predominantly plant-based, with high consumption of fruits, vegetables, and whole grains, coupled with regular physical activity, which is a common denominator among the long-lived (An Italian village celebrates its many centenarians, 2021). Additionally, these lifestyles often involve low stress and

a strong sense of community, factors that have been scientifically proven to contribute to longevity (Kolata, 2007). Conversely, in affluent societies, a higher income does not equate to a longer life; factors such as social inequality and lifestyle diseases significantly reduce lifespan (Life expectancy vs. GDP per capita, 2018).

Those on the other side of the issue may say that having a lot of money can make you live longer. They believe that if you're wealthy, you can get treatments from the best doctors and hospitals. This money can also let you buy fresh, organic foods that are good for your health. And it's true, money can open doors to high-end health clinics and fancy grocery stores with the best produce. Nevertheless, my point still stands because there is a bigger picture. Beyond money, the bonds we form with others, mental health, and a sense of purpose are super important for a long and happy life. Think about it: having friends to laugh with, share memories, and support you during tough times can make life worth living. When we are mentally healthy, we handle stress better, enjoy the little moments, and can bounce back from hardships faster. Having a strong reason to jump out of bed with excitement, whether it is a hobby, a job, or helping others, can give our lives direction. For instance, often live longer, and this is hypothesized to be due to the strong social support and sense of purpose they find within their communities, not their material wealth (Barber, 201 C.E.). This shows that there's more to life than just material wealth.

The evidence clearly supports the notion that while material wealth offers certain conveniences, it is not the critical determinant of longevity. Longevity is a tapestry woven from multiple threads — genetics, lifestyle, mental fortitude, and social connections — and these elements, not wealth, are the cornerstones of a life well-lived. Therefore, individuals and societies alike should reorient priorities from wealth accumulation to the enrichment of these other aspects, fostering environments that support these true pillars of a long, fulfilling life.

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
